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REPORT ON ONE-DAY WORKSHOP ON BIRD MONITORING AND DATA COLLECTION

On February 13, 2024, the Department of Zoology, in collaboration with the Nature Club, organized an enriching one-day workshop on Bird Monitoring and Data Collection. Mr. Hari Mavelikara, a noted bird watcher, environmental activist, and coordinator of Pathanamthitta Birders, served as the chief resource person for this session. The workshop aimed to equip students with essential skills for bird monitoring and data collection, enhancing their understanding and appreciation of avian diversity.

Objectives

The primary objectives of the workshop were to:

- 1. Educate students on bird identification and monitoring techniques.
- 2. Highlight the importance of citizen science in avian data collection.
- 3. Provide hands-on experience in bird watching and data recording.

Sessions Overview

The workshop comprised three comprehensive sessions, each designed to cater to different aspects of bird monitoring and data collection.

Session 1: Feathered Friends of Our Ecosystem

The first session, titled 'Feathered Friends of Our Ecosystem,' focused on bird watching and avian diversity. Mr. Hari Mavelikara provided a detailed guide for beginners on bird identification, emphasizing:

- Identifying birds by their color, shape, flying patterns, and calls.
- Understanding the characteristic behavior patterns of birds.
- Exploring the peculiarities of bird nests and migration patterns.

He utilized pictures and audio recordings to make the session interactive and informative, greatly benefiting those new to bird watching.

Session 2: Bird Monitoring and Citizen Science

The second session addressed the significance of bird monitoring and the role of citizen science. Key topics included:

- The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) and Campus Bird Count (CBC).

- The use of eBird, an online database for bird observations.

Mr.Hari Mavelikara explained how students could create an eBird account and submit their observations, stressing the importance of contributing to scientific data and the privilege of participating in citizen science initiatives. This session was particularly timely, preparing students for the upcoming GBBC and CBC events.

Session 3: Field Visit to Erayilkadavu

The final session was a practical field visit to Erayilkadavu, a nearby wetland, held at 4 pm. For two hours, students engaged in bird watching under Mr. Mavelikara's guidance, equipped with binoculars and cameras. The students enthusiastically participated and successfully identified 38 bird species, including several rare migratory species. This hands-on experience was invaluable, allowing students to apply their newly acquired skills in a real-world setting.

Participation

A total of 39 students participated in the workshop. Their active engagement and enthusiasm throughout the sessions were commendable, reflecting the success of the training.

Impact

The workshop was highly effective and well-received by the participants. It provided them with a comprehensive understanding of bird identification and monitoring, as well as the tools and knowledge necessary for contributing to avian data collection and citizen science efforts.

Report on International Tiger Day Extension Activity

Objectives

2. Educate students on the threats posed to tiger populations, especially poaching.

Participation and Submission Process

- Authenticity of the creation.
- Creativity and the inclusion of relevant quotes.

- Overall representation of the theme "Preserving the Roar: Combating Poaching for a Thriving Tiger Population."

The competition successfully highlighted the significance of tigers in our forests and the pressing issues they face. By engaging in the competition, students conducted research and reflected deeply on tiger conservation, gaining valuable insights.
